CF-AYO, the first Noorduyn Norseman, ready to enter the St. Lawrence River in Montreal, just prior to it's first test flight on a cold and windy November 14th, 1935. The 20 minute flight, flown by J. McDonough, the test pilot for Lloyds of London, was a success. But shortly after landing, a guide boat coming alongside in the wind whipped water slit one of the pontoons with it's metal rudder - and the plane nearly sank. A long night's work by one of Noorduyn's small but dedicated staff, had the plane ready for additional test flights the following morning by McDonough and Leigh Capreol.

Robert H. Noorduyn's second trip to Red Lake was made to officially dedicate Norseman Heritage Park and a beautifully restored CF- DRD, which he did on July 25, 1992. The favour will be returned on July 25th, during this year's Norseman Festival, with the dedication of a memorial to him in Norseman Park.
